9.00 to 11.00 The infrastructure gap – shifting the paradigm (Forks Ballroom)

The recent FCM report, "Danger Ahead: the coming collapse of Canada's municipal infrastructure", advises that municipalities have a \$123B gap, of which \$40B is for community and recreational facilities. Governments world wide tend not to fund the maintenance of infrastructure, and all levels of Government, federal, provincial and municipal, face the same issues although the options available are different. Treasuries will never have enough funding available. This session explores the multifaceted problem – the funding gap, the accounting and budgeting dimension and the program and service delivery dimension – and looks at jurisdictions outside of Canada, with an emphasis on shifting the paradigm to find solutions. To what extent can Public Policy shift the infrastructure paradigm and encourage new ways of accessing, using, funding and managing infrastructure? How do we encourage programs to think strategically about their portfolios and occupancies? How do we build capacity and leadership to do this?
